<u>Axolotl Journal: Part 3</u>

On our third journey to study the amazing Axolotl, we noticed some very cool adaptations that are unique to the Axolotl. The first thing we noticed about the Axolotl is that their gills are on the outside of their bodies! The Axolotl's gills grow near the bottom of their heads, and they look like a lion's mane, or like three little trees' growing on each side of their skull. This is very cool, and makes them look awesome.


The second adaptation that we observed is that these creatures are just big babies. The Axolotl appears to be a creature that suffers from neoteny, which means that they live their whole lives in their baby, or larval form. They get bigger, but rarely go through metamorphosis to finish their transformation. On some very rare occasions, we have seen some Axolotl go through metamorphosis, and when this happens, they become a Mexican salamander. It is really a very cool thing that they can stay in their larval form their whole lives, because they can get to be about 12 inches long, and live for 15 years. They really are big babies.

The final adaptation that we have seen on this trip is something that would be a very handy skill to have. The Axolotl can grow back body parts. We mentioned in our last journal that we have seen Axolotl snacking on each other, and what is amazing is that the Axolotl can grow back their limbs, gills or tail if they get bitten off, damaged, or lost. Can you imagine how awesome it would be if we could do this? It would be amazing if people could regrow lost or damaged limbs - these are such cool creatures!

<u>How Potato Chips Are Made: A LEGO</u>


Narration

When you bite into a crunchy, seasoned, yummy potato chip, do you ever wonder how it is made? How do potato chips turn from dirty, brown potatoes into crispy, golden chips? Here's how:



Step 1: Peeling and Cleaning

To be peeled and cleaned, potatoes are dumped (1) into a large container (2) which is supplied with water by a hose (3). Using friction from the water and the potatoes rubbing up against each other, the potatoes are peeled and their skins are washed away by the water.



Step 2: Slicing

The peeled potatoes are then rolled along a conveyor belt (1) until they get dumped into the slicing machine (2). The slicing machine pushes the potatoes through sharp blades (3) so as to cut them into potato chip-size pieces.




Step 3: Frying and Inspecting

The potato pieces are sent along another conveyor belt (1) which dumps them into a big vat of oil (2). A worker moves the pieces around the vat to get them fried completely (3) and when they are ready, he pushes them onto a third conveyor belt. Another worker picks out bad chips which are deformed or stuck together (4) and puts them into a bin. At the Route 11 potato chip factory, these bad chips are fed to cows at a nearby farm.

Step 4: Seasoning and Bagging

The potato chips continue traveling on a conveyor belt until they get to a third worker (1). This worker fills a cup with seasoning from a big bin and then dumps it onto the chips. After being seasoned, the potato chips fall into a bagging machine (2). The bagging machine measures the chips by weight and dumps certain amounts down a tube (3). This tube is surrounded by potato chip bags. When the chips fall down the tube, they fall into a bag, which is sealed by a machine (4). The bagged potato chips then go along a fourth conveyor belt where a fourth worker (5) places them into boxes to be shipped all over the world.

Abigail: Yeah, so people actually call me by my normal name now.


Reporter: Do you feel like when you have a problem you can't really go to your siblings, or do you think that you didn't used to go to your siblings you had a problem?


Ancient Biblical Kingdoms: For Kids!



The Assyrian empire was a collection of many city states which ruled much of the Middle East through warfare and innovation. It began in a city called Ashur in the Late Bronze Age (1600-1200 BC). Ashur was a major regional power, and started off as a city state in the second millennium BC. Ashur grew in power in the early first

millennium BC under powerful rulers and became one of the world's first empires.

Assyria was located in northern Mesopotamia and covered much of modern-day Iraq, Iran, Kuwait, Syria, Lebanon, Israel, and Turkey. As a city-state, Assyria underwent many changes, including falling to the Babylonian empire and the Mittanis. Unlike other city states, though, through technological advances in warfare Assyria managed to maintain its land for a long period of time while other states and empires rose and fell. When a group called the Hittites






rose to power

and overthrew the Mittanis, the region fell into war and chaos. Assyria took advantage of this and a new series of Assyrian kings, beginning with Adad Nirari II, expanded into a huge empire.

The Assyrians took over enemy cities one by one, gradually expanding. This is because

while other empires came and went, the Assyrians had developed technological advances in warfare that other states didn't have. For example, the Assyrians had iron weapons and



iron armor for many of their soldiers. They also had a seperate engineering unit which would set up ladders and ramps, fill in moats, dig tunnels, and do many other things to give the Assyrian soldiers an advantage. Thirdly, the Assyrians were the first to build chariots, which allowed them to have more protection on the battlefield. Through these technological advancements, the Assyrians were able to go on the



offensive and attack their enemies for the first time, leading to the expansion of their empire.

After maintaining power for hundreds of years, the Assyrian empire became too large to maintain and collapsed. But, even after its fall, the Assyrian empire's legacy left a huge influence on society.

The Toy Review Series: The Awesomeness of KEVA Contraptions

If you've ever bought the toy 'contraptions', made by KEVA, you have probably discovered that Contraptions are an awesome, multi use toy. Although contraptions advertise one use, they are much more amazing than they may seem at first. Here are three uses for contraptions that make them so awesome:

1. Ball rolling

This is the use that contraptions are meant for. If you buy a set of contraptions, you will most likely have directions for how to use your wood planks to make tracks for your KEVA balls to run down. Some things that you can make with the instructions are the 'Shooting Gallery', 'Turbine', and 'Step Curve'. But, one cool thing about Contraptions is that you can use your own creativity to create your own tracks to roll your ball.


2. Building

This is a use not advertised by KEVA. Using your Contraptions as blocks, it is possible to make many cool structures. I myself have made ships, houses, trains, castles, fortresses, and even battlefields for toy soldiers! The steadiness and balanceability of Contraptions allows you to try out many cool engineering techniques, though the limited size of the blocks keeps you from doing a few things. However, I personally enjoy the limits of Contraptions, as in my opinion it's nice to have a challenge.

3. Machines

Building simple machines with Contraptions can be a bit tricky, but it can be fun. One thing you could try making with Contraptions is a Rube-Goldberg machine. That's a machine which goes through an intricate process just to do a simple task. You can use Contraptions as dominoes, catapults, and tracks for KEVA balls like mentioned in use 1.

My favorite machine that I have made is a catapult. There is a real Contraption catapult set, but I make a simple catapult with three planks by placing one plank on top of another, perpendicular to each other with the middles lining up. I place the third plank on the end of one side of the top plank, parallel to the bottom plank. To launch, I bang with my fist on the side of the top plank without the third plank on it. The third plank will launch in the air!



So, those are three reasons why Contraptions are awesome! Just so you know, I have not been paid by the Contraption people to say this, but I think that Contraptions are a pretty awesome toy to get. Actually, as I look over the laptop that I am writing with, I can see a bin of Contraptions out on the ground! Hopefully if you have Contraptions, you have some new ways to try them out, and if you don't, you have a good gift idea or request! Source Cited:







for ears and sea lions have flaps.


- 3. Seal pups are ready to swim and dive only a few hours after birth.
