Exclusive interview with CJ Dunlop

Today we will interview the weekly pastor's kid. This week; CJ Dunlop. We have a few questions for CJ.

Reporter: Ok, hi CJ! I am from the Pastor's Child Magazine, and for our first issue, you have been chosen as our Kid of the week!

CJ: Thanks for choosing me! It's a really big honor to be interviewed for a magazine. Except that... I'm the editor. I guess it isn't much of an honor. Oh well.

Reporter: Well anyways, CJ, today we at Pastor's Child have some questions for you that would be really useful for other Pastor's kids around the neighborhood. We know that these days, it's pretty tough to be a Pastor's kid. When your dad is preaching, and you're sitting outside, it's really hard not to be distracted. Also, Pastors are often really busy, even if you want your dad.

CJ: Yeah, I agree. It's really tough for me and my siblings when our dad has to go to things like Elders meetings, or stays at church extra long to talk to people. Now what were you saying about questions?

Reporter: Yes. We have three questions for you that might be useful. Here's the first one:

When your dad is preaching, or leading a meeting, how do you amuse yourself?

CJ: That's a good question. It's especially tough when I have to sit on my own, or with my brother. Usually when you sit to listen to a sermon, you have your parents

with you. But when your dad is the one doing the teaching, it's a lot different. Usually what I do is that I take notes, if it is a class or a sermon. I like to listen to what is happening, and basically do what an adult would do. But, if you don't feel up to doing that, you can always do things like doodle. Try not to do anything too noisy.

Reporter: That's a good answer. Hopefully that helps all you kids out there who might be reading this. Our second question for you is:

How do you make friends with other kids when your parents are watching?

CJ: That's also a good question. It's often hard to have a good conversation with another kid when your parents are looking on. It just doesn't feel...natural. I, personally, get a bit nervous. But, I think the best thing to do in this situation is to try to smile at the other kid, or introduce yourself. It's always good to try. You could tell the other kid some fun things about yourself. Or, if you are able to, invite them to play tag or something. Your parents will like that.

Reporter: That sounds good. Those are some good things that kids should probably try. Here's our last question for you:

How should you act when your parents are talking to someone new at church?

CJ: Wonderful question again. I have come across this situation many, many times. When your dad is a pastor, you end up being introduced to a lot of adults. There are *tons* of adults who know me, but I have no idea who they are. When you are introduced to someone new, it is really

hard not to be shy, and hide behind your parents. But what I would recommend is to fight that impulse, and to say something polite like "hello", or answer any questions that the person asks you. I know, though, that this is a really tough situation.

Reporter: Well, that's our last question for you today, Cj. Thanks for your great responses. I really hope a lot of Pastor's kids, and other kids, are benefited by your responses.

CJ: You're very welcome. It was an honor to be interviewed. Have a good day!



Who was Jerome?

Important people in the history of Christianity.



Jerome was a Christian priest who lived in the 4th century A.D. He is best known for translating most of the Bible into Latin. Jerome was born to wealthy Christian parents in Stridon, Dalmatia (near modern Slovenia). He was born around 342 - 347 A.D. Jerome was educated in Rome, where he studied grammar, rhetoric, and philosophy. He was baptized at age 19.

Like other students, Jerome went travelling around the Roman Empire once he finished his studies. On his way, though, instead of discovering the

pleasures of the empire, he became interested in the ascetic people that he met along the way. After a while, he joined a group of elite ascetics. Ascetic is another word for a hermit, or person who lives in religious seclusion. The group of ascetics eventually broke up, and Jerome became a hermit in the Holy Land, which is what people back then called Israel. Exhausted from his travels, he made it to Antioch, where he studied Greek. He then learned Hebrew from a Jewish Convert. Soon, he became a widely known scholar and monk.

After a few years, other hermits began to suspect Jerome of being a secret heretic, so Bishop Paulinus made him a priest. Jerome did not actually do priestly duties, though, but plunged himself into study of the Bible. He attended lectures, examined Gospel texts, and met other famous theologians.

In 382 Jerome was summoned to Rome, to be secretary and possible successor of Pope Damasus. While in Rome, Jerome sharply criticized the way the Romans there lived, criticizing things like their vanity and pride in their beards. When Pope Damasus died, Jerome fled to the Holy Land. There, he realized that many different texts of the Bible varied in accuracy, and were not all completely correct. So, he decided to translate the bible into Latin.

After 23 years, Jerome completed his translation. Jerome died in Bethlehem on September 30th, 420 A.D. His translation was used by Christians for the next 1,000 years.
