


"C'mon, guys, take them out!" Jacob yelled as he disrupted a third monster's nasal system. "Go for the storage cart!"

"Get up, kid," He said. "We're in need of support."



## Flags: Estonia

Hi, it's Lucas. In place of the "Today's Country" series I did a while back, I will be writing a series of short articles of flags of different countries. So, to start off, I thought I'd pick one of my favorites: Estonia. The flag of

Estonia is a horizontal tricolor with blue on the top, black in the middle, and white on the bottom. The flag was commonly used before the country became independent in 1918 but was adopted as the official national flag in 1922. The flag was in use until the Soviet Union invaded Estonia in 1940 and banned the flag. In 1988, the flag usage of the flag was permitted again. The flag was re-adopted in 1990, one year before Estonia became independent. I think this is a cool flag because one interpretation of it is that the flag represents the country's winter landscape, blue for the sky, black for the forest, and white for the snow. Another thing that is worth knowing is that a proposal for the Estonian flag looked like a Nordic Cross, honoring the country's Nordic heritage. However, the country chose to keep this current flag. And, fun fact, Estonia's neighbors (Russia, Lithuania, and Latvia (kinda)) also have horizontal tricolor flags!

**Rocky:** It's that we get to come to the church, to walk to the church, and we don't have to drive a long way. So, we can get here when the songs start.


**Reporter:** Our second question is: What is it like to do the service in the church parking lot?

Reporter: Is it sometimes hard?


Rocky: Yep.

### <u>Bashan</u>



#### Ancient Biblical Kingdoms: For Kids!

Bashan, a country which was frequently cited in the Old Testament, was the northernmost of the three divisions of ancient Palestine. It was known for its rich pastures and thick forests. Most of Bashan's area (4,334 sq. mi) is covered by basalt as a result of lava eruptions in the Pleistocene period or later. In New Testament times, Bashan was one of the great granaries of the Roman Empire. Throughout Israel's monarchy, Bashan was contested between Israel and Aram-Damascus. Afterwards, during the Greco-Roman period, it was divided into four districts: Batanaea, Gaulanitis, Trachonitis and Auranitis.

Because of sustainable rainfall and its lava soil, Bashan is a very fertile region. Once possessing rich forests and pastures, it is praised by the Bible for its lofty trees (Isa.

2:13; Ezek.

27:6; Zech. 11:2), its cattle and sheep (Deut.32:14; Amos 4:1; Ps. 22:13), and as an area of outstanding fertility (Isa. 33:9; Jer. 50:19; Nah.1:4). Although its forests have disappeared long ago, good pasture is still found in Upper Golan





and on Jebel Druze. The

Plain of Bashan is noted for its hardy, superior wheat. In Numbers, the Israelites defeated Og, king of Bashan, and assigned his land to the half-tribe of Manasseh.

After rule by the people of Manasseh, Bashan was conquered and pillaged by the Assyrians who held it from 732 to 610 BC. Between the years 84 to 81 BC, Bashan was ruled by Alexander Jannaeus of Judaea. Then, the Romans made Herod the Great ruler of the area. By AD 635, a major regional city, Damascus, fell to the Muslims and thereafter Bashan's prosperity greatly declined.





## KiDS Section: For <u>KIDS</u> 6 or younger

Hi all kids out there! I'm CJ, and today we are going to talk about typing. Typing is a major skill today that you will learn, or you might have already learned. Today, many things need computers, so let's take a short lesson on typing!

Let's start with the home row. These keys are:



A, S, D, F on the left, and J, K, L, : and ;, on the right. When you type, you put your left pinky on the A key, your left ring finger on the S key, your left middle finger on the D key, and your left

pointer finger on the E key. Do they same with your right hand with the : and ; key and the K, J, and H keys. This is where a typist's fingers rest. When you want to type another key, you move your finger upwards or downwards. If you do this a lot, eventually your fingers will memorize the keys, and you will become really fast! If you want to type, try typingclub.com to practice.
