## **Rilla of Ingleside**

Book Report by Rose Jamieson

Rilla of Ingleside, by L.M. Montgomery, is set during WW1. The story takes place on Prince Edward Island. This book is about Anne Blythe's youngest daughter Bertha Marilla "Rilla" Blythe maturing during WW1. It's also about how change is part of growing up. This book is historical fiction because Rilla and her family weren't real, but their time period was.

Rilla starts off as a vain and gigglesome 14-year-old before the war. Then, one day, at her first party, she learns about England declaring war on Germany. "Able bodied men" were called for on P.E.I. because it was part of the British Empire. Before long, Rilla's brother Jem and a few close friends have enlisted as soldiers. Rilla learns that part of growing up and becoming a woman is painful and hard. She tries to be plucky and cheerful, but it isn't always easy. She goes through many dark valleys, such as when her beloved brother, Walter, goes to war and is killed in the charge of Courcelette.

Still, there are a few bright spots, such as when Rilla adopts a little baby boy whose mother had died and whose father was a soldier. Rilla also finds a bright spot in a budding romance with Kenneth Ford. Rilla grows more womanly and enduring during the war. In her own words, "They have been . . . terrible years--and yet I have a queer feeling of thankfullness for them--as if they had brought me something very precious, with all their pain." Rilla learns about patience, and trusting God in everything.

This book also shows the spirit and bravery of the soldiers in the trenches. I wanted to share this letter from Rilla's brother, Jem. "Tell mother not to worry--I'm all right--fit as a fiddle--and glad I came. There's something across from us here that has got to be wiped out of the world, that's all--an emanation of evil that would otherwise poison life forever. It's got to be done, dad, however long it takes, and whatever it costs . . . we are . . . fighting for the preservation and safety of all sweet wholesome things."

I would definitely recommend this book. L. M. Montgomery made Rilla seem so real! She has such real struggles and emotions, and it's wonderful how Anne of Green Gables is Rilla's mom. I would give this book a 4.5 because not everyone likes a little bit of romance. All in all, this is a sweet, heartwarming book about life during WW1.



## Who was Augustine?

Important people in the history of Christianity.



St. Augustine, also known as Saint Augustine of Hippo, and also known as Aurelius Augustinus, his latin name, was born on November 13th, 354 in Tagaste, Numidia, which is present day Souk Ahrar, Algeria. He was bishop of Hippo, one of the latin fathers of the church, and as some people think the greatest thinker after the apostle Paul. He wrote many things, but the most important of which are the Confessions and The City of God. These works helped lay the foundation for medieval and modern Christian thought.

Augustine's parents were of a respectable Roman class, but they weren't super rich. They managed, sometimes on borrowed money though, to get him a first class education. Augustine first studied in Tagaste, then in Madauros, and finally in Carthage, where after going back to Tagaste he returned and taught rhetoric, which he was very good at. At the age of 28, Augustine left Africa in 383 to make his career in Rome. After two years of teaching in Milan, though, he resigned his teaching position and returned to Tagaste. There he raised a son, Adeodatus, but after his death Augustine became a clergyman in the city of Hippo. There he was converted to Christianity, and wrote many of his works that we know about today. Augustine became bishop of Hippo sometime around 395 or 396. As Bishop in 411, Augustine fought against a heresy called donatism, which was led by the Roman Catholic church. He won a public debate in June, and stopped the heresy. When Augustine was almost 60, he encountered another heresy, Pelagianism, which said that we are all good, and aren't sinners, and that Adam's sin affected only him. Augustine stopped that heresy too, and Pelagius was excommunicated by the church in 418. Augustine died on August 28th, 420, a testament to how we should defend the gospel at all costs against heresies and false teachers.

# **April Fools Day**

If you're a kid, you're probably familiar with this day. I mean, what sorts of kids aren't? But you probably don't know the history of April Fools Day, and how it started.

April Fools Day is celebrated on April 1st each year, and has been for several centuries, by many different cultures. Typical April Fools traditions include hoaxing, joking, or yelling "April Fools!" to end a trick. But, it's exact origins remain a mystery.

Some historians believe that April Fools Day comes from back in 1582, when France switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar. In the Julian calendar, the new year began sometime around the spring equinox, or April 1st. People who didn't get the news fast enough or were too forgetful to recognize the start of the new new year became the butt of jokes, and were called 'April fools', as they would celebrate the end of the year in late March. People played pranks on them like having paper fish placed on their backs, which symbolized a young, easily caught fish — a gullible person.

Some historians have linked April Fools Day to festivals such as Hilaria, a joyful festival which was celebrated in ancient Rome at the end of March. It involved dressing up in disguises and mocking fellow citizens.

Still other historians believe that April Fools Day was tied to the vernal Equinox, the first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere, when Mother Nature fools people with unpredictable weather.

Here are some historic April Fools Day pranks:

- 1. In 1957, the BBC reported that Swiss farmers were experiencing a record spaghetti crop, and showed footage of people harvesting noodles from trees. Definitely not real.
- 2. In 1996, Taco Bell, the fast-food restaurant chain, tricked people when it announced it had purchased Philadelphia's Liberty Bell and had decided to rename it the Taco Liberty Bell.
- 3. In 1998, when Burger King advertised a "Left-Handed Whopper," tons of clueless customers requested the fake sandwich.
- 4. Google annually hosts an April Fools prank, which in the past has been everything from the "telepathic search" to the ability to play Pac-Man on Google Maps.
