Dolphins Chapters 1 - 3

Did you know that there is more to the sea than just beaches, sandcastles, and a BUNCH of water? There are also animals in the sea. In this article you will learn all about dolphins, one of the best (in my opinion) animals in the sea.

Dolphins are just predators (something that relies on other animals to live), right? Wrong! In this chapter you will learn all about what dolphins eat. The only things that eat dolphins are great white and tiger sharks, right? Wrong! Now here is a list of things that eat dolphins: Great white sharks, tiger sharks, bull sharks, orcas, and other large types of sharks all eat dolphins. Basically sharks and orcas eat dolphins. Sharks and orcas can easily catch dolphins, right? Wrong! Usually dolphins swim too fast for sharks and orcas, so sharks and orcas have to be very fast and sneaky. The dolphins will go around the shark or orca to scare it away, but if the predator does not get scared away the dolphins will fight together. However, sometimes dolphins get eaten and that is okay because sharks and orcas need to eat it to keep the food chain in balance. Dolphins are completely vegetarian, only eating seaweed and other plants, right? Wrong! Dolphins eat fish and shrimp and also they use a special skill called echolocation to find their food. If you want to learn more about echolocation, read the next chapter. Actually, we'll change the topic of this chapter entirely to echolocation, right? Wrong! Now in this chapter we're talking about predators and prey. The prey will obviously try to flee and I don't blame them because their life is at risk. And so do dolphins. Dolphins also flee from predators plus they are much smarter, so they have a backup plan if fleeing doesn't work. Time for the next chapter! Keep reading and get bored, right? Wrong!

Chapter 3: Echolocation and Food

Dolphins have great eyesight and spot food from miles away, right? Wrong! Dolphins use echolocation (the location of objects reflected by sound). The dolphin sends out sounds, and the sound waves bounce back off objects. To find food, though, the dolphin must

make extremely loud sounds, easily getting food but easily making them food by alerting predators from a mile away, right? Wrong! To find food dolphins send out a noise and if the soundwaves hit something like a fish, the same noise will bounce back and they know where their food is. They will eat the thing that they caught and then they will usually sleep for 3 hours, right? Wrong! They will usually catch more prey until they're full. It's like a mealtime. They will then go back to playing and doing stuff with other dolphins. Dolphins usually eat fish, shrimp, and sometimes other things and they use echolocation to find their food.

The Stock Market Crash of 1929

The Stock Market is a place for selling or buying parts of companies and businesses. Those parts of companies and businesses are called stock. One of the most famous Markets is the New York Stock Exchange (NYSE), located on Wall Street. There are other Stock Markets around the world, such as the London Stock Exchange in England, the Tokyo Stock Exchange in Japan, and the Midwest Stock Exchange in Chicago.

People who have stock are referred to as a stockholder or a shareholder. If you are a stockholder, you own part of a company and can share in its growth. For example, what if I bought \$50 worth of stock from Apple before they released a new product? Their demand would go up because of the new product, and so would the amount of money my stocks are worth! I would get more money from my stocks.

But, if Apple's newest product wasn't a big hit, and they lost a lot of money, my stocks will be worth much less. This is one of the dangers of the Stock Market. There is no agreement as to whether you will make money or not. The worth of my stocks can change drastically overnight.

People can sell stocks too. If I no longer thought Apple was a good investment, I might sell my stocks to somebody else. Then I can invest in stocks somewhere else. People make money selling stocks by selling them for more than they bought them for. Also, if the price of someone's stocks is going downhill very fast, they might sell the stocks before they lose more money.

That's what happened in October 1929. The price of stocks had dropped considerably on the 24th, with alarmed stockholders selling stocks for low prices. On the 25th and 26th, the trade was decent, but on the 27th it got worse. Again. People were starting to panic, and camping out on Wall Street, the site of one of the world's biggest Stock Markets. Then disaster struck. On October 29th, 1929, more than 16 million shares of stock were sold, three to four times the normal amount!! People were selling at very low prices before they had to sell any lower.

This was a calamity. In weeks, Wall Street had lost \$30 billion dollars. In weeks, people reliant on the Stock Market had gone broke. In weeks, the U.S. had changed. In time, the Great Depression would begin.





Who was Raymond Lull?

Important people in the history of Christianity.



Raymond Lull was born at Palma in Majorca, an island in Spain, in 1232 A.D. He was a Spanish Theologian, a poet, and a missionary to the Arabs. Through family connections, and his own talent, Lull started his career as a courtier at the court of King James I of Aragon, and then King James II of Majorca. In 1263, he became a Christian. He left his wife, who was not a Christian, and began studying Arabic and philosophy to help convert Muslims to Christianity. In 1272 Lull had a vision, though we aren't sure if he really did,

on Mt. Randa in which he saw a system for using basic principles to solve problems. In 1276 Lull founded the College of Miramar in Majorca, which taught people Arabic and prepared them for missionary work in Islamic lands. He made many trips to those lands, and wrote 150 - 200 pieces of writing in Latin, Arabic, and Catalan! After his missionary work in Armenia in 1302 and Africa in 1306, Lull returned to Paris to continue his work against the teaching of the Latin Averroists. He wrote 17 tracts against the teachings of the Averroists. In 1311 Lull attended the Council of Vienna. After a while, in 1314 Raymond Lull decided to return to missionary work, this time in North Africa. While preaching in Tunisia though, he was stoned to death by a crowd. He died aboard the ship that rescued him.

Short Story: the ANT Series. Civil War.

(Read this in context of the last story. Next story is called "The Factory of Anada".)

As King Vordyzeven's first action, he called in the Black ants army and pushed the Red ants out of his territory, setting up the city of A-Salt as his capital.

Once the Black ants broke free from the Red, king Burnsorba officially declared war on Aykay Vordyzeven and his new kingdom, setting the borders from En Gol bay down to the Patio, down to the small bridge. The Black ants assented. In late February, 2021, King Burnsorba set out with 100,000 picked troops and marched on the stronghold of Vernia, just east of the small bridge. The governors of Vernia cried for help to Vordyzeven, and the Black king sent 80,000 troops under the command of General Bazuka towards Vernia. Upon seeing that he had a great number of troops, Burnsorba held his ground at Vernia, and sent troops to harass the flank of the Black ant army. The Black ants did not leave the area, though, and on March 2nd launched a massive counterattack against the Red ants. The Red ants were beaten with heavy losses, and fled to the cover of the Great Statue, and the strongholds of Baroga, Searelia, Ouchana, and Flamelenia. The Black ants pursued the Red, but fell back when they reached the border. Vernia had been saved for the time, and was supplied with 50,000 troops hand-picked by the king. These troops had no incidents that might cause a fight for the next month.

Once Burnsorba was beaten back, he immediately began to build up his army again, to the power it had been at during the war with the Termites. His first action was to recall 300,000 of his troops which had been sent home after the ants regained their independence, increasing his troops to 400,000. Then, he issued a decree in all of Red ant territory, and 80,000 more troops were raised, who hadn't fought in the Termitian wars. Thus, Burnsorba increased the number of his troops from 100,000 to almost half a million, all ready to march on the Black ants when the signal was given. In response to this, Black ant king Vordyzeven drafted 200,000 troops from around his territory, and set up massive weapons factories and armories, which manufactured swords, shields, spears, and other war articles. Vordyzeven also set up training and recruiting facilities around the territory, and established an elite division of 50,000 well-trained ants called the Shotins, all of which had gone through training facilities which were set up around the kingdom. So, Vordyzeven increased increased his army to 300,000 ants, and even though it was smaller than the Red army, it was much better trained.
